



A copy of this information is enclosed in your Real Estate Tax Statement for 2016. The Village of Pleasant Prairie mails your tax statement to you and collects your payment on behalf of Kenosha Unified School District, Kenosha County, the Village, Gateway Technical College, the public library system, and the State of Wisconsin.

General Information About Your Property Tax



Making Your Payment

Village Hall office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Village offices will be closed on December 23, 26 and 30, 2016 and January 2, 2017.

Your entire real estate tax bill, or your first installment, is due by January 31, 2017. Failure to meet this deadline will result in the entire tax bill becoming due and payable. Additionally, interest and penalties at the rate of 1.5% per month will begin to accumulate as of February 1, 2017. Payments not received at Village Hall by February 7, 2017 or postmarked on or before January 31, 2017 are delinquent. There are several ways for you to make your real estate tax payment.

Installment Plan Option

The Village offers a three installment payment plan for your real estate taxes only. Please refer to your enclosed statement for the respective due dates and amounts for each of the installments. If an installment is delinquent, the total remaining unpaid tax becomes delinquent and interest and penalties are calculated back to February 1, 2017.

Pay From Home

The Village offers the option of using credit cards to pay real estate and personal property taxes. Payments can be made either online or by telephone through **Official Payments Corporation**. **Official Payments** will charge a convenience fee averaging 2.5% - 3.5% for this service. Since the credit card customer will be paying the fee, this service will not cost the taxpayers that do not choose this payment option any extra expense. While this fee may seem excessive, it may be less than the delinquency interest and penalties described at the left.

Save Time – Pay By Mail

Make your check payable to the Village of Pleasant Prairie, write your tax parcel number on the check and enclose the payment stub only (top portion of your Real Property Tax Statement). A receipt will be mailed to those who choose this option.

Village Hall Drop Box

For your convenience, a 24-hour drop box is available for payment of your tax bills. It

is located on the north wall of Village Hall to the right (west) of the main entrance at 9915 39th Avenue. Please enclose your payment stub along with a check in an envelope before depositing. No cash please. Village Hall will be closed on December 30, 2016 and January 2, 2017. Payments deposited in the drop box on these days will be receipted in 2016. A receipt will be mailed to those who choose this option.

Lottery Credit

The maximum 2015 lottery credit was \$114.25. As of the printing of this notice, the maximum 2016 lottery credit was not yet available. Only owners of a home in Wisconsin who used the home as their primary residence on January 1, 2016 qualify for the credit. An owner who qualifies for the credit but whose tax bill does not reflect the credit, may claim the credit until January 31 with the Village of Pleasant Prairie Treasurer.


Online Tax and Payment Information

Inquiries can be made by property address or parcel identification number. The site contains a considerable amount of information about your property, including taxes due and taxes paid. Tax payment information is updated daily.



Where Does Your Property Tax Payment Go

Property tax receipts will be printed and given at time of payment or mailed to those not paying their tax bill in person.



What Happens to the 21%

The majority of 2017 budget dollars (approximately 69%) will be used to provide public safety services, such as police, fire and rescue, and public works services, such as snow plowing, road maintenance, and similar work. The remaining amount (roughly 31%) will be used to: pay down existing debt, finance General Government's day-to-day operations, operate a Community Development Department, and maintain the Village parks. Percentages* for each area are shown below.



47% will be invested in public safety services, including police, fire and rescue



22% will be invested in public works services, such as snow plowing, road maintenance and the like



8% will be used to pay down existing debt, and another 17% will be used for general government operations



6% will be used for the Community Development Department and the Village parks system
